
Genre: Magical Realism; Children's Fantasy & Magic


Theme: You never know how strong you are until being strong is the only choice you have. Quick Pitch: An exciting story of magic, fun and challenges for grade school children (7-12 years old) that pulls the reader into the life of the hero and the supporting characters and teaches valuable lessons about the mind, attitudes, integrity and choices.

Synopsis: In Lucas Lightfoot and the Fire Crystal, Lucas Lightfoot considers himself to be a regular boy, yearning to be like the heroes in the books he reads. His quiet life changes when he finds a chameleon – Prescott, a mysterious and magical lizard. Prescott teaches Lucas powerful secrets that go way beyond the magic any young boy would love to have. With this power, Lucas realizes he can change the relationship with a special girl in his class and maybe even the class bully. Learning to control this new power with his head and his heart, Lucas recognizes the greatest change is the one taking place within. Lucas learns just how strong he can be when being strong is his only choice. His biggest challenge comes when Lucas must overcome his greatest fear to save the life of a friend and a helpless stranger. There has never been another with the birthright legacy before Lucas and he must be protected from the enemy until he develops the strength to fight the forces that would steal his light and destroy him. Will Lucas have the courage to meet the challenges on the path before him?

In <u>Lucas Lightfoot and the Water Tomb</u>, Lucas is given new powers as he continues his training with Prescott. Lucas is challenged by a far more deadly bully that will stop at nothing to take light and power from Lucas. As Lucas summons the courage to protect himself and his family, he finds new friends in nature that support him in his fight to stay alive.

In Lucas Lightfoot and the Sun Stone, Lucas learns that he has the





birthright to become a great Light Bearer. There are dark forces which attempt to thwart him from his destiny. Lucas and Hailey travel to Africa, Europe and South America to be taught by the Master Light Bearers. From each, they are given a key that they must protect and use to unlock the Sun Stone. It's up to Lucas to learn to use the power given to him to help those in need and expose those who destroy his light. Lucas learns his greatest power is in his heart.

Bio: Hugo Haselhuhn lives in San Luis Obispo County. He enjoys reading, writing stories and poetry, cooking and traveling with his bride of 44 years. They have five children and 14 grandchildren. As a teacher, he knows how to grab the student's attention and can find positive lessons in everyday experiences. By day, Hugo is a creative design engineer and by night he is a creative story teller with designs on improving the lives of children. As a wordsmith, he has created an outlet for the adventures that children everywhere would enjoy as they become the hero.



Luke Cowdell lives in Orange County and is in the 5th grade. He loves BMX racing, riding his motorcycle in the

desert and playing both Minecraft and Terrenia. He is an avid reader with an active imagination. Luke is also a deep thinker who asks questions seemingly beyond his years. When he was seven years old, Luke decided he wanted to write a chapter book and *Lucas Lightfoot and the Fire Crystal* was born as a result from him asking for help in writing a chapter book. Luke told his grandpa where he wanted to go with this book, and Hugo created the road, painted the scenery and together they created the characters and adventures along the way.

Author Q&A

Q: Why did you write this book(s)

A: <u>Lucas Lightfoot and the Fire Crystal</u> began as a request from my grandson, Luke, to help him write a "chapter book." It's a special young man, who, at the age of seven, announces to his mother that he wants to write a chapter book. It's a special mother who has the belief that he can and she will do everything possible to help her son fulfill his dream. So what does this special mother do? She says, "I bet Grandpa Hugo can help you." Of course I had to say yes! As I continue to write, it is to transport children of all ages to a place between reality and fantasy so they can learn through the choices and experiences of the characters. I write to change the world, one child at a time.

Q: Where did you get the name Lucas Lightfoot? Is Lucas your grandson?

A: Well, Lucas Lightfoot could be my grandson and maybe I could be Prescott. The name we chose, though, is significant. Lucas means "light" and Lightfoot is an old English name given to a quick messenger. Lucas Lightfoot is a "quick messenger of light."

Q: What do you hope to accomplish with these book?

A: Through the story, my goal is to entertain and to teach. The ultimate purpose of teaching is to change lives. The story includes:

- Importance of choice and accountability.
- Value of learning and improving the mind.
- Attitude and belief in one's ability to help others.
- Integrity and honesty are still valuable traits.
- Value of love, understanding and gratitude.

I am sharing important values to a rising generation that is bombarded with anti-heroes who embody the traits of selfishness, lying, power-seeking and bullying. The positive ideas in the book are expressed as the magical mentor helps a young boy become the hero he dreams to be. There is excitement, danger and challenges throughout the story.

Q: Did you or Luke write the book?

A: Luke is the idea source and I do the writing. He wanted to write a book about a Lunch-Time Hero. Together, we took that idea and expanded it to a full chapter book for 7-12 year old children. My grandson and I discuss the characters and events in the book. Together we worked on the various powers that Lucas Lightfoot learns to use.

Q: Where do you get your ideas for the story?

A: Actually, many ideas in the book have come from the life of my grandson and many ideas are just from my imagination.

- My grandson/co-author really did find a chameleon in front of his house which they named Prescott.
- Prescott really was living "in the wilds of Orange County" for about a year.
- My grandson's uncle is a firefighter and was caught on the ridge with fire all around. His crew barely made it safely into their fireproof cocoons before the fire swept over them. In real life they all survived.
- My grandson's school in Orange County has an award-winning garden.
- My grandson hangouts on the tire swing and the trampoline in the yard with his friends.

Q: Do you ever have any speaking engagements?

A: Yes! We really want to make a positive impact on our readers. One way is to visit elementary schools and give our M.A.G.I.C. presentation and share the values in the book. M.A.G.I.C. is an acronym for Mind, Attitude, Goal, Integrity and Choice. My grandson cannot be at most of the school presentations because he is in school himself. During the presentation I show a video clip of my daughter and grandson talking about goals. The students watching the video are focused and attentive as they see a boy their age published a book, and they too can do wonderful things as well.

Q: Do you have a favorite author?

A: I really enjoy Steve Berry's books with retired spy Cotton Malone character. Berry always weaves in a lot of historical truth mixed with his brand of fiction. I also enjoy books on

Neuro-Linguistic Programming and have woven a few of these skills into the book and in the presentation. Luke has all of the Percy Jackson series by Rick Riordan, Maze Runner series by James Dashner and Harry Potter by J. K. Rowling. Luke is an avid reader, so much so, that in the fifth grade, Luke won an award from his school because he read more books than any other student.

Q: Did you originally self-publish the book?

A: Yes. As I mentioned, I wanted to help my grandson publish a book and self-publishing was the fastest way to accomplish the goal. After we self-published the Fire Crystal in 2013 and the Water Tomb in 2014 through CreateSpace, we were fortunate to have Morgan James agree to publish the Fire Crystal in 2015. Additional chapters and illustrations were added and a new book cover was created for the Morgan James edition.

Q: Should parents read the books with their children?

A: Teachers, parents and grandparents have told me over and over how wonderful it is to read Lucas Lightfoot with their children and grandchildren. There are moral lessons woven throughout the story that can start important discussions. Reading with children will give you an opportunity to discuss the deeper meanings found in the story. Each chapter begins with an epigram that gives a hint of the moral lesson in the chapter and can become a starting point of significant discussions between parents and children as they explore the meaning which allows the children to reach a little deeper into their lives to see how it can affect them. The adventures found in the Lucas Lightfoot books will engage your children's interests and speak to their emotional needs. The readers are learning through the eyes and experiences of the characters.

Q: Why would I want my child to read this book?

A: There can be many reasons besides just the pure fun and excitement of the story. Here are a few reasons.

Respect: When my children were teenagers there was a certain primetime cartoon show that I did not want in our home. The boy character was always showing disrespect for the father disguised as humor and the father was regularly presented as stupid. The writers of the show were aiming the humor at children viewers because I am sure kids would like to think themselves smarter than their parents. Children learn by example and that was a negative trait I did not want for my children. The young characters in the Lucas Lightfoot books are respectful of the adults. There are a few adult characters that do not deserve respect, only sympathy.

Bullies: Lucas explores with his teacher some of the reasons why bullies act the way they do. Rather than retaliate against the bully, Lucas tries to understand why the bully treats others badly. The conversation Lucas has with Kevin is not too different from an actual experience shared with me by a friend. His eight-year-old son asked the bully at school why he treated him so badly. The bully replied he wanted attention. My friend's son offered to be his friend and play together at school. This same eight-year old boy was heard to say that he and friends were playing Lucas Lightfoot on the playground at school and using different powers in their imagination. Lucas thinks that if he uses his magical power, he can help the bully learn to be kind to others. This backfires on Lucas and he realizes that he is now the bully. The reader learns that if one is not careful, they can unwittingly become a bully.

No Short Cuts: Children learn by playing and develop skills for life. One important skill is the ability to work and enjoy the rewards. When "things" are given to you without the prerequisite of work, there is a lack of appreciation and an attitude of entitlement. Lucas is given the assignment to do some chores for his mother. He agrees readily, but sees an opportunity to use a little magical power he has been given to let the magic do the work. (Think of Disney's cartoon, with Mickey Mouse as The Sorcerer's Apprentice.) Lucas has been warned to use his power only for good and unselfish reasons. Forgetting this counsel, Lucas uses the power of telekinesis to rake and sweep the leaves from the front yard only to see his efforts have backfired on him. His mentor, Prescott, asks with some possible sarcasm, "Having a little trouble sweeping the porch?" Lucas realizes that there is no short cut to work and gets out the broom.

Q: What are your future plans for Lucas Lightfoot?

A: In many of our classroom visits, the students want to know how many books we plan to write and if there's going to be a Lucas Lightfoot movie. Luke and I will release the second book, Lucas Lightfoot and the Water Tomb, through Morgan James Publishing this fall. The third book, Lucas Lightfoot and the Sun Stone will follow early next year. Beyond that, we have plans for at least two more Lucas Lightfoot books.
